mayor, Mortensen would apply the data-based decision making that allowed the sign company to grow profitably to the city of Green Bay in what he refers to as the "smart city" approach. He explains this approach will reduce redundancies and allow smarter decisions to efficiently allocate taxpayer money.

Mark Steuer

Mark has represented the west side's District 10 on the City Council for the past six years, including service as the Council's vice president. His top three stated priorities are repairing Green Bay roads at a rate of



3.3% per year, working with the administration and City Council to develop a uniform citywide Capital Improvement Program (CIP), and to reduce debt to improve bond rating.

Guy Zima

Guy is a former Green Bay City Council Alderman (40 years) and Brown County Supervisor (42 years). He lost both seats in the most recent election. Zima has often clashed with outgoing mayor Jim Schmitt and has filed



a defamation suit against the city and against the mayor himself. Upon leaving office, Zima was the subject of a code of conduct complaint which has since been dropped.
